# TO THE INTERNIENT CANPS

Channel Islanders were taken by boat to St. Malo where they were transferred onto trains. In some cases they had to travel in luggage or freight carriages. The Germans gave them some food at the start of their journey, but nothing more was forthcoming until they reached their destinations. What followed was an arduous journey lasting several days that took them half way across Europe.

The islanders deported in September 1942 first went to the transit camp of Dorsten, in the German industrial region of the Ruhr. They spent several miserable weeks there before being moved on to their final internment camps of Biberach, Laufen and Wurzach. Some of those who were deported from the Channel Islands in February 1943 were forced to stop at the transit camp in Compiègne, just outside Paris. Segregated from the main part of the camp the islanders spent weeks watching thousands of French Jews through the barbed wire who were being moved on to concentration camps and certain death. During May 1943 these islanders were transported to the internment camps of Biberach and Laufen.

As time progressed internees were moved between the various camps and some found themselves transferred to camps at Kreuzberg, Spittal am Drau and Liebenau.



#### SEPT 29, 1942 3.15PM 🚯

BOARD A TRAIN AND LEAVE ST MALO We waited in the train for five hours before it started, during that time two German soldiers came around with our rations ¾ of a German loaf each and a sausage about 14″ long , then they came around again with a bunch of French grapes and an apple, this had to last up to three days.

At 3.15 the train started the railway runs alongside a main street in St Malo...

They then took our money off us. We were then taken to another place for medical exam by German medical officer. We were given our number then I had to collect my blankets etc and we were taken to our hut when I saw the place it nearly turned me sick.

On the morning of the 12th at 6 o'clock all bowls knife fork spoon etc had to be handed in. We then had to wait until 9 o clock, some walked to the station.
