December 15 th 1870	Lat. 36 S and Long. 53 W	John Stone was taken ill with violent chills, pains in the head and feverish, gave him a dose of castor oil, and after that operating 3 grains of quinine every 8 hours. W C Jones Henry Johns Mate	
December 25 th 1870 Off Staten Island, Cape Horn	Lat. 54 S and Long. 65 W	John Stone found himself a little better, but still giving him 3 grains of quinine 3 times a day. W C Jones H Johns Mate	
January 9 th 1871	Lat. 49 S and Long. 82. 30 W	John Stone found himself quite well and returned to his duty. W C Jones H Johns Mate.	
February 20 th 1871 6 a.m.	Port of Punta Arenas Costa Rica	Henry Best complained of a violent pain in his chest, took him on shore to see the doctor who gave him some medicine. He stopped on shore under the doctor's care four days, after which finding himself quite recovered, came back on board and returned to his duty. W C Jones H Johns Mate	

March 28 th 1871 Noon	Port of Punta Arenas Costa Rica	John Stone laid up with fever and ague, took him on shore to see the doctor, who gave him some medicine. W C Jones H Johns Mate	
April 4 th 1871	Lat. 6 N and Long. 84 West	John Stone quite well again and returned to his duty. W C Jones H Johns Mate	
Monday April 24 th 1871	Lat. 16 S and Long. 99 W	John Stone taken ill with fever and ague, gave him 10 grains of quinine which appeared to check the chills gave him 10 grains of quinine the following day and also some strengthening food. W C Jones H Johns Mate	
April 27 th 1871	Lat. 24 S and Long. 104 W	Gave John Stone 10 grains of quinine and good slop diet found him getting better but very weak. W C Jones H Johns Mate	
April 29 th 1871	Lat. 28 S and Long. 103 W	John Stone found himself a little better, gave him 10 grains of quinine also 2 small doses of 3 grains each during the day, and good diet and some port wine. W C Jones H Johns Mate	
May 2 nd 1871	Lat. 35 S and Long. 100 W	John Stone found himself getting better gave him 3 grains of quinine three times a day and good strengthening food with a little brandy and milk. W C Jones H Johns Mate	
May 8 th 1871	Lat 50 S and Long 88 W	John Stone quite recovered, found himself much stronger and returned to his duty. W C Jones H Johns Mate
