November 20 <sup>th</sup> 1872 Wednesday 11 a.m.	Lat 26 N Long. 24 W	Alfred le Huray complained of a blood rash, with little pimples on his right arm, to all appearance like erysipelas, administered opening medicine, powdered the arm with flour and kept it bound up. W C Jones H Johns	
November 22 <sup>nd</sup> 1872 Friday 4 p.m.,	Lat. 20 N Long 25 ½ W	Matthew Gallienne complained of being unwell, on questioning him found he was labouring under venereal disease (chancres). Ordered him to wash with warm water three times a day, giving him purging medicine and black wash to apply to the member. W C Jones H Johns	

December 7 <sup>th</sup> 1872 Saturday 8 p.m.	Lat. 18 S and Long 36 W	Alfred le Huray recovered of his rash. W C Jones H Johns	
December 12 <sup>th</sup> 1872 Thursday at noon	Lat. 26 S and Long 42 W	Matthew Gallienne quite recovered but still gave him a small dose of Epsom salts every other day. W C Jones H Johns	
December 17 <sup>th</sup> 1872	Lat. 32 S and Long 48 W	Discontinued giving medicine to Matthew Gallienne, he being well. W C Jones H Johns	
January 7 <sup>th</sup> 1873 Tuesday 10 a.m.	Lat. 58 S and Long 69 ½ W	Alfred Le Huray complained with pains in the thighs, and much difficulty in walking, on examination and inquiry learned that he had had the venereal disease two years previous, administered five grains of iodide of potassium three times a day. February 1 <sup>st</sup> 1873 Saturday 8 p.m.	Lat. 19 S and Long 83 W	Discontinued giving Alfred Le Huray any more medicine he having recovered. W C Jones H Johns	
March 13 <sup>th</sup> 1873 Thursday 10 a.m.	At Punta Arenas	Found T Robilliard quite drunk and incapable of doing his work in the galley, could not conceive where he had obtained the liquor, but on opening the fore hatch, found a case had been broken open and seven bottles taken out, in examined his chest, and the forecastle but could not find any trace of what had been abstracted from the case before mentioned he being off duty and one man in his place. March 14 <sup>th</sup> 1873 Friday noon	P. Arenas	T Robilliard still drunk and incapable of doing his duty, obliged to put one man in his place. W C Jones H Johns	
March 15 <sup>th</sup> 1873 Saturday 6 a.m.	P Arenas	T Robilliard returned to his duty. W C Jones H Johns	
May 14 <sup>th</sup> 1873 Wednesday 6 a.m.	P Arenas	Sailed from Punta Arenas for London ships draught of water 16 ft 6 ins aft and 16 ft forward. W C Jones H Johns	
April 16 <sup>th</sup> 1873 Saturday 10 a.m.	Lat. 42 ½ N and Long 24 ½ W	William Realey sprained his ancle in falling over the corner of the fore hatch, causing it to swell and produce great pain, ordered him to bathe it and gave him some linement to rub it with and keep the leg quiet. Off duty.
