







# **Roman Times 200AD**

Roman boats travelling from Gaul (France) to Britannia (England) pass the rock outside St Peter Port Harbour. The Castle has not been built yet.


















King Henry VIII ordered new walls to be built. Cannons were now in use and the castle had places called batteries built for them.

# **Castle Cornet 1500s**

Henry VIII's daughter Elizabeth was Queen by the time the new walls were finished so she put her coat of arms over the entrance.



# **Castle Cornet 1500s**

The castle was used as a prison. These women are being taken away to be burnt because they didn't go to church.



## **Castle Cornet 1600s**

In the English Civil War, Castle Cornet supported King Charles of England and the Island of Guernsey supported the Parliamentarians. The Castle and Guernsey are at war!



# **Castle Cornet 1600s**

After the Civil War Sir John Lambert (a Parliamentarian) was imprisoned in the Castle.



### **Castle Cornet 1670**

The new Governor Charles Hatton brought his family to the Castle.


Two years later his family were killed when the keep of the Castle




# **Castle Cornet 1700s**

New barracks for the soldiers and their families were built.






# Castle Cornet 1800s
